ecember's graduation celebration recognized fourteen graduates earning Executive Master of Public Administration, Executive Master of International Relations and CAS in Leadership of International and Non-Government Organizations. Current students, Humphrey fellows and Visiting Executive Scholars were among those honoring Exec Ed's most recent graduates on a wintery evening.

E.M.P.A. graduate Min Thu Aung was selected to provide reflections on his experience from Myanmar to Maxwell. He expressed gratitude to the many who encourage and supported his studies: professors, the Syracuse Myanmar community, his wife, and his mother, who instilled the importance of education in him. "My time in Maxwell has made me a stronger...and better person! My life has been changed for the better," he reflected. "I now know how to ask better questions, how to find out things I want to know and how to communicate it effectively. More importantly, how to work lead or work in a group. I believe I have the skills and knowledge that will be useful in contributing to rebuilding Myanmar. I am ready, and for that...I am eternally grateful to the Maxwell community."

Professor of Practice Catherine Gerard paid tribute to Walter Broadnax, who had passed away the week before. "I think of him tonight because he defined himself as a public servant and took great pride in that title, Catherine reflected. "He said at one point, "public service isn't about something you do today and then you're done. It's about improving the world -for the people that live in it." She considered the charge those in public administration have in collaborative governance concluding, "We need to embrace a new definition- where leadership is about shared power, facilitating the ideas of others, and measuring success based on how people see value in government action. This is the challenge I leave you with as you return to your lives as public servants. I have faith that you can do it!"



Peer to Peer Series Highlights Experiences of Midcareer Professionals

he Peer to Peer continued its focus on Executive Education midcareer professionals with a robust speaker series open to the Maxwell community. Exec Ed students, Humphrey fellows, Visiting Executive Scholars and a SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry Fulbright Visiting Scholar presented on a wide array of topics. Two Exec Ed students were featured speakers during this academic year:

Shahzeb Khan (EMPA): China Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC): Myth vs Reality

Shahzeb offered perspectives on CPEC based on his experience as former Director General of Gwadar Development Authority, where he was a member of many CPEC working groups. He was also a 2016-2017 Humphrey Fellow at Maxwell.



Gabriel Uy (DCP): Healthcare challenges for the U.S. National Guard and Reserve

Gabriel discussed the different roles of the U.S. National Guard and Reserve, how they are being activated at the highest frequency since WWII and the challenges faced in their healthcare and insurance coverage, offering recommendations to alleviate them. Gabriel was most recently White House Associate Director of Intergovernmental Affairs.

Alumna Returns to Maxwell for Moynihan Discussion

She discussed the governance challenges she faced during her tenure, which coincided with the COVID-19 pandemic response and the 2021 Peruvian presidential election. She is a lawyer from the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú (PUCP) and currently the Senior Manager of Institutional Relations at Southern Peru Copper

Corporation. Her accomplished career has been in both the public and private sectors in Peru.

She also had the opportunity to catch up with Catherine Gerard and meet with Humphrey fellows and Executive Education students. Nuria was a deSardon-Glass fellow while at Maxwell and was able to connect with current recipients during her talk, which was sponsored by the Program for Latin America and the Caribbean at the Moynihan Institute of Global Affairs.

She and other InterFaith Works staff met with Syracuse Humphrey fellows to talk discuss the process of resettling refugees in the Syracuse area, the role of volunteers and the various funding mechanisms of the nonprofit.

reports he was awarded the rank of Police Colonel, the highest rank of Mongolian Police by the Commissioner General. He is currently the Chief Inspector of INTERPOL National Central Bureau (NCB) of Mongolia (since December 2017). While Chief Inspector, his country became the first Asian country to test INTERPOL's Digital Witness Platform, hosted the INTERPOL workshop 'Fighting Against the Illicit Traffic of Cultural Property" and accepted as a beneficiary country of INTERPOL's 'Project Leader', which provides sustainable digital forensics capacity-building to law enforcement agencies in selected Asian countries. He also stated that although the global pandemic and resultant border closures hindered fugitive extradition operations, Mongolia extradited two fugitives in 2020 and 2021 who were all subjects of INTERPOL Red Notices and successfully participated in the INTERPOL operation 'Trigger Salvo', which strengthens passenger and cargo controls capacities of participating countries and became the first country to test INTERPOL's mobile device, with direct access to the INTERPOL database at border checkpoints. He reflected, "My Maxwell experience, especially knowledge about leadership and international security matters have been the key for my successful career in Mongolian police organization," he states.

Mark J. Cohen '13 E.M.P.A. was recognized by the U.S. Department of State, where he retired at the end of 2021, with a Meritorious Presidential Rank Award in February. The Bureau of Global Talent Management's Office of Performance Evaluation hosted the ceremony where Secretary of State Antony Blinken recognized the Department's recipients and presented the awards. These were first awarded by the President after the establishment of the Senior Executive Service in 1978 and the Senior Foreign Service in 1980, conferred at the President's discretion. The Meritorious Service Award recognizes sustained superior accomplishment.

The joint sessions were established to provide a setting outside the classroom for Exec Ed students to connect and have a common experience where they can further consider issues of leadership.



Defense Comptrollership Program Prepares Future Military Comptrollers

he Defense Comptrollership Program has a storied history at Syracuse University and was highlighted on Syracuse University's website in October and again in May. There have been more than 2,000 graduates since the 1950s. DCPs complete a dual MBA and EMPA in the specialized 15-month program, the only such program in the U.S.
