Abstract: This dissertation investigates the development of the post-New Deal administrative state through the lens of iterative judiciary-bureaucracy interactions over time. I supplement the existing administrative state literature by providing a new perspective on a familiar theme: the administrative state, I argue, is characterized by dual legal systems answering similar questions at similar times involving similar, and often identical, disputes and disputants. The development of the administrative state and administrative law, then, can be explained through analyzing the iterative interactions between these two legal systems. These interactions, on the whole, are characterized by deference, especially on the part of courts to administrative agencies. Given the fact that extant doctrine does not seem to restrain courts, why do courts still choose to defer in this parallel legal order? How does the presence of a plurilegal order in the American administrative state affect the development of both courts and administrative agencies?
